But in the moment, I told her that in reading the philosophical, liturgical, and spiritual dimensions of Maximus' writings, everywhere we turned we found Christ the Lord. I found that so much of what we were reading seemed like long meditations on some of my favorite verses of the letter to Colossians, especially Col 1:14-23. Limited space sadly keeps me from reprinting this beautiful Scripture in its fullness, but essentially, it reads as a hymn to the preeminent Christ and his creative and

The overall point that Paul points to in Colossians, and I think Maximus would agree, is that the amazing, powerful, beyond all-knowing, and universe-creating God has come to know and love us in Jesus the Incarnate Word. What a wonderful thing to reflect on this Epiphany season! Jesus has come that we might love, worship, and serve him and that his love would be made manifest through us, dear friends.

So, as we head into February, with the Feast of the Presentation at the beginning and Ash Wednesday at the month's midpoint, I pray that we would yet find Jesus at every turn. As the collect from the Second Sunday of Epiphany exhorts us, may Christ be known, worshiped, and obeyed to the ends of the earth, and indeed in the lives of the saints here at Saint John's!

Greetings Friends!

Winter is definitely here, as the recent bout of icy weather and unseasonable cold temperatures reminded us. I hope by the time this letter finds you, our weather situation will have significantly improved.

The icy and cold weather did have some minor effects on our building and grounds. Our maintenance team spent a good deal of time clearing ice and snow off the walkways and parking lots to allow for safe travel around the grounds. Snow melt was used where possible to help with this. Inside, our water system had only one minor issue that was resolved. We also had one of our older heaters in the Fox Library fail, which has now been fixed.

After removing our oak tree late last year, we discovered an electrical box for powering the lights buried

near the labyrinth that needed to be relocated. That has now been accomplished, and our labyrinth's outdoor lighting is back on during the evenings.

Looking forward to the warmer weather, our Gardens and Grounds team will focus on removing the declining hedges north of the building heading to the playground. These hedges are in a poor state, and we will focus on their removal in the upcoming months. As always, contact Mike Reif or myself if you are interested in helping with ground maintenance projects.

On the Transfigure project, we are close to completing our drawing package for construction. Meetings between our architect and ministry leaders have progressed, and our layouts for the basement, kitchen, and flower room have been set. Our architects are putting together the final drawing package that should be completed in February. Once we have a completed drawings package, we will gather quotes from at least three contractors who can perform a project of this size and scope. We anticipate quotes being back from our potential contractors in March, with a selection of one of them in April. Then, the fun of demolition and construction will begin. This is a very exciting time, and I'm so thankful for the generosity of our parish in supporting this major upgrade of our physical plant.

I look forward to speaking further with you about all of the good work our B&G team is doing and on our Transfigure project during our annual meeting in February.



GETTING TO KNOW RUSKIN BELL


