GREETINGS, FRIENDS!

What a delight it was to serve at the ordination of Dr. Carson Webb to the Sacred Order of Priests! That mid-August evening saw an absolutely bursting parish church. The nave was filled with the people of God, lay and ordained, gathered for the intention of his praises and to be a party to the ordination of new priests for Christ's own Church. On the operational side, I am deeply grateful for all the hard work Amanda Storms and her team of volunteers offered to make a memorable evening. I believe God was honored in our effort, and that Father Carson now joins the ranks of priests, now a steward of Christ's sacraments and a shepherd of his flock.

Since ordinations have a necessary focus on the candidates for Holy Orders, we can make the easy mistake that the liturgy is "for them." We can do this with any Christian liturgy if we're not careful; how many times have I said something like "I didn't get anything out of Church today" as if I myself am the object of the service and not God himself. I was glad that Bishop Poulson remembered the 20th century Anglican writer Evelyn Underhill as part of the corrective to that impulse. Some of her great insights, as Bishop Poulson reminded us, were parts of a letter she sent to Archbishop of Canterbury, Cosmo Lang:

"We look to the Church to give us an experience of God, mystery, holiness, and prayer which, though it may not solve the antinomies of the natural world, shall lift us to contact with the supernatural world and minister eternal life."

What a stunning reminder of the vocation of the Church, a body capable of so much good but no greater good than that of entering into the Lord's presence and the proclamation of the full life of God in Christ. Later, she writes:

"God is the interesting thing about religion, and people are hungry for God. But only a priest whose life is soaked in prayer, sacrifice, and love can, by his own spirit of adoring worship, help us to apprehend Him."

What a humbling reminder of the role to which the priests of the church have been called. Notice, though, that Underhill rightly understands that the priests are those whose work is meant to lead the people of God to his adoration, that the first priority in the life of any body of Christians is to love God with all of their heart, mind, soul, and strength. All the other amazing aspects of our common life work best when they flow out of our devotion.

I pray that God would ever inspire my heart and subdue my will for such a rich calling! Pray for me, beloved! This September, I hope that in our all of our exciting events, all of our ministries new and old, all that we do here at Saint John's would be devoted to God's glory and the extension of Christ's loving Kingdom.

Over the summer, we had a very good Garden and Grounds clean-up day. We successfully removed the

remaining fence post between the sidewalk and the north parking lot. This has opened the lot access to sidewalk and playground all along that walkway. We also weeded and mulched several garden beds.

We are definitely seeing steady progress on our Transfigure project. Over this summer, we've successfully upgraded and expanded our fire suppression system to the kitchen as a part of our remodel effort. The new fire suppression system was approved by the Fire Marshal in August. New floors have been completed in both the kitchen and flower room. Plumbing and electrical upgrades/moves have been completed as well. In our kitchen, we should be completing construction in September after receipt of our new stainless steel countertops. We've already seen the installation of the new FRP walls and stainless-steel splash panels that look great on the walls!

In the basement, we've completed a lot of work and are beginning to see the shapes of the concept layout come to life. All framing was completed last month, and we have also completed the sheetrock installations to create our rooms. Electrical and mechanical rough-ins have also been completed, and all plumbing lines have been run to their new locations. We've also removed the old wire and piping in the basement, pulling many old runs that are no longer in service. This has made the ceiling significantly cleaner looking for our final product. Our updated grease trap for the kitchen has been installed in the basement. Its location will allow for much easier maintenance access for future cleanouts.

We've also ordered a limited amount of new furniture for the basement classrooms, which is due to arrive in November. This will allow the rooms to be usable as soon as they are complete. The furniture is designed to be comfortable, durable, and more storable, aligning with our vision of a multi-use space concept for the basement.

Overall, we expect the kitchen and flower room to be completed in September and our basement to be ready in November.

Lastly, if you are interested in serving on the Buildings and Grounds committee, stop by and see us at our table on Rally Day on September 15th. We're always looking for more people to help around our parish.






